Daniel Goleman (1995) defines Emotional Intelligence as the ability to recognize, understand, and manage one's own emotions, as well as to understand and influence the emotions of others. EI comprises five domains:

- Self-awareness
- Self-regulation
- Motivation
- Empathy
- Social skills

Research shows that students with high EI demonstrate better academic performance, lower behavioral issues, and more positive peer interactions (Mayer, Salovey & Caruso, 2000). Emotional intelligence is also linked to long-term success and adaptability in life beyond school.

The Interconnection between Value-Based Education and Emotional Intelligence

Value-Based Education and Emotional Intelligence are inherently interconnected. VBE provides a moral and emotional framework that enables the growth of EI in learners. The development of empathy, for instance, is nurtured through value education that encourages compassion and respect for others. Similarly, self-regulation is enhanced when students learn the value of patience, tolerance, and non-violence.

- **Reduces Stress and Anxiety:** Practices like meditation and value-based discussions enhance emotional regulation and reduce mental tension.
- **Improves Interpersonal Relationships:** Values like empathy and cooperation improve classroom dynamics and reduce conflicts.
- **Enhances Self-Esteem:** Understanding and living by values promote self-confidence and moral integrity.
- **Fosters Resilience:** Ethical grounding provides strength during crises and setbacks.

Empirical studies (Sahu & Sharma, 2019) confirm that students exposed to value-based and emotionally aware learning environments report higher levels of satisfaction and life skills.

National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and Value-Based Education

India's National Education Policy 2020 strongly advocates for holistic, value-oriented, and competency-based education. NEP 2020 emphasizes character building and ethical reasoning as essential components of school and higher education. It recommends:

- Integration of moral and ethical reasoning in the curriculum.
- Life skills education including emotional awareness.
- Use of ancient Indian knowledge systems to instill universal values.

- d. **Co-curricular Programs:** Encourage student participation in community service, moral debates, and cultural activities.
- e. **Assessment of Values:** Develop rubrics to assess behavior, cooperation, and ethical decision-making—not just academic grades.

Challenges in Implementation
